CENTRAL PLATTE NRD

Board Meeting Minutes November 21, 2019

CALL TO ORDER: Vice-chairman Mick Reynolds called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. He reported that the NRD abides by the Open Meetings Act in conducting business and said that a copy of the Open Meetings Act was displayed on the south wall of the conference room, that the Board reserves the right to change the order of an item on the agenda, and some items on the agenda are subject to closed session.

MEETING NOTICES: Vice-chairman Reynolds reported that the notices of the meeting had been published in the Grand Island Independent and the news release was provided to other media outlets in the District.

MEETING MINUTES: Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the October board meeting minutes. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor, except Marvion Reichert, Steve Sheen and Keith Stafford, who abstained. Motion carried.

ANNOUNCEMENTS & OTHER BUSINESS FOR FUTURE MEETINGS: Vice-chairman Reynolds asked if there were any announcements or suggestions for future meetings. There were none.

PUBLIC FORUM: Vice-chairman Reynolds asked if anyone wanted to address the board on any item not included on the agenda. No one requested time to speak.

2018/2019 AUDIT REPORT: Jake Klabenes, Lutz CPA and Audit Manager, reviewed the audit report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019. He said the independent auditors' report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance and other matters was based on an audit of financial statements performed in accordance with government auditing standards and that no problems were encountered.

Following a brief discussion Marvion Reichert made the motion to accept the fiscal year 2018/2019 audit. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

NRCS REPORT: Joe Krolikowski, NRCS Liaison District Conservationist, reviewed the fiscal year 2020 EQIP (Environmental Quality Incentives Program) initial allocations to the NRDs (see enclosed report).

EXCUSED ABSENCES: Vice-chairman Reynolds reported that Jim Bendfeldt, Charles Maser and Barry Obermiller had requested to be excused from the board meeting.

Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the absences as requested. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

EASTERN PROJECTS COMMITTEE: Committee Chairman Ed Stoltenberg reported on their meeting held earlier that day.

Upper Prairie/Silver/Moores Creek Project – Ed reported they had reviewed the proposed Change Order #2 on the contract with Van Kirk Brothers Contracting for the Silver Creek levee that is part of the Upper Prairie/Silver/Moores Creek Project. The change order would add \$7,424.30 and includes moving some top soil, additional seeding, and added rock rip-rap.

Ed Stoltenberg made the motion to approve Change Order #2 to add \$7,424.30 to the contract with Van Kirk Brothers Contracting for the Silver Creek levee that is part of the Upper Prairie/Silver/Moores Creek Project. Keith Ostermeier seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

General Manager Vogt said this will finish out the levee portion of the project.

Proposals for Multi-jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan – Ed said the committee also discussed authorizing JEO Consulting Group to develop a grant application for FEMA funds to update the multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan. FEMA requires the plan to be updated every five years and our last update was two years ago.

Ed Stoltenberg said the Eastern Projects Committee is recommending, and he made the motion, to authorize JEO Consulting Group to develop the FEMA grant application for funds to update the multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan. Doug Reeves seconded

the motion.

Alicia Haussler asked what the cost of JEO's service would be to develop the application. General Manager Vogt said it would be approximately \$105,000.00. If the grant is approved FEMA will pay for 75 percent of the cost of the update; however it will be next November before we know if it is approved.

The motion was then voted on. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

NITROGEN MANAGEMENT PROGRAM – REQUEST CEASE & DESIST ORDERS FOR 2019 FARM REPORT VIOLATORS: GIS Image Analyst Luke Zakrzewski said last month it was reported that we had not received reports on 553 fields involving 153 different landowners. A letter was sent to the landowners concerning the non-compliance of the reporting and as of that morning we are down to 104 fields owned by 58 different landowners. He said he would make the recommendation that cease and desist orders be filed on those remaining 58 landowners.

Marvion Reichert made the motion that cease and desist orders be issued to the 58 landowners for non-compliance of submitting the Groundwater Management Plan reports on 104 fields for 2019. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion.

In answer to a question concerning how this year's noncompliance compares to a year ago Luke said he thought this year was about half of what we had last year at this time. General Manager said the reports are actually due by March 31 and said it is the goal for next year to have this process done by the end of April.

Vice-chairman Reynolds asked if the individuals who will be issued cease and desist orders have to be published at this time. General Manager Vogt said they do not need to be published but the list should be available and referenced in the minutes so we have a record of it.

After discovering that the list had not been put on drop box as intended, Vice-chairman Reynolds tabled the motion until the names could be provided to the directors prior to the vote. Vice-chairman Reynolds also asked for a copy of the letter that was sent to the landowners last month.

A discussion followed on the landowner letter. It was stated that by the time a letter is sent to the landowner we have contacted the tenant two or three times with a post card as well as a letter. Also discussed were some problems the producers were having with one or more of the co-ops that had agreed to submit the reports but had apparently not followed through.

MEMORANDUM WITH THE USDA-NRCS FOR A CONTINUED WORKING AGREEMENT: General Manager Vogt said that approximately every 10 years we

update and renew the working agreement with the U.S.D.A. Natural Resources Conservation Service. The agreement spells out the responsibilities of each agency, our relationship, and how we go about implementing conservation programs within the District. He said it is time for the renewal and said he would recommend the board approve the new agreement.

Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the renewal of the Memorandum of Agreement between U.S.D.A. Natural Resources Conservation Service and Central Platte NRD. Deborah VanMatre seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

2019-2024 LONG RANGE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN: I&E Specialist Marcia Lee said the draft plan was mailed to the directors a couple of weeks ago and it was also put on drop box for the directors' review. She said it is required that the plan be updated every year and submitted to the state (NE Dept. of Natural Resources). She said every section was updated and most of the changes are minor. The two sections that had major changes were in the flood control starting on page 7 and water quantity starting on page 22. She said she had not received any suggestions for corrections or amendments. She asked if the directors had any suggestions. There were no suggestions.

Alicia Haussler made the motion to approve the 2019/2024 Long Range Implementation Plan as presented. Jay Richeson seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

Classroom Mini-grant Thank You from Glenwood Elementary – Marcia briefly reported on a thank you received from teacher Annette Colling who had submitted a request for and received a classroom mini-grant. She sent information and pictures on the results of the water pollution experiment conducted by the class at Kearney Glenwood Elementary (see enclosed).

MANAGER'S REPORT: General Manager Lyndon Vogt reported that the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service has approved Central Platte NRD for two NRCS Watershed Flood Protection Operations grants, one for the lower Wood River Watershed and one for the Buffalo Creek/Spring Creek area in the western part of the District. The watershed plan would include payment for 30 percent of design on recommended structures and will also make us eligible for the next round of grants that would pay for engineering and construction but would not include costs for land rights. As soon as NRCS gets the new budget they will release funds to us and we can start moving forward. He said we have been working with JEO Consulting Group on some possible dam sites in the Wood River watershed area but have not yet been working with anyone in the Spring Creek/Buffalo Creek area.

Also reported was that Central Platte NRD has received a one-year extension on the RCPP (Regional Conservation Partnership Program) through May 2021. In the five years we have had a RCPP grant Central Platte NRD producers have received \$1.7 million

through the program.

General Manager Vogt reported that Central Platte NRD and Upper Big Blue NRD have been contacted by The Nature Conservancy in the past few days concerning the fact that TNC is considering applying for a substantial RCPP grant that would be aimed at promoting soil health and have invited both NRDs to partner with them. Information will be forwarded to the board as it becomes available.

Also included in his report was the fact that a local UNL Leadership Group is discussing establishing an endowment for Invasive Phragmites management on the Platte River, NE Department of Natural Resources is currently conducting a levee inventory for the State, and also reminded the board of Central Platte NRD's annual water programs update to be held at the Dawson County Extension Building on February 12th.

NITROGEN MANAGEMENT PROGRAM – REQUEST CEASE & DESIST ORDERS FOR 2019 FARM REPORT VIOLATORS: Vice-chairman Reynolds asked that the list containing the names of the 58 landowners who are not in compliance with the District's Groundwater Management Plan Rules and Regulations because the required groundwater management reports have not yet been received be handed out to the directors for their review, along with the letters sent to the tenants and landowners concerning the non-compliance (see enclosed).

Marvion Reichert amended his original motion that cease and desist orders be issued to the 58 landowners for non-compliance of submitting the Groundwater Management Plan reports on 104 fields for 2019 and that the list of those not in compliance that was distributed to the board at the meeting be included in the meeting minutes. Alicia Haussler seconded the amended motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

ELECTION OF THREE-MEMBER NOMINATING COMMITTEE TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR BOARD SECRETARY & TREASURER: Vice-chairman Reynolds reported that the district's Bylaws require the election of a three-member Board Officer Nominating Committee at the November board meeting with a report to be made in December and the election of board secretary and treasurer to be held in January. The Bylaws also state that board officers can only serve two consecutive, two-year terms in the same office. Deb VanMatre would be eligible to serve another two-year term as secretary but Charles Maser has served two consecutive two-year terms as treasurer so would not be eligible to serve in that office.

Following a brief discussion Brian Keiser made the motion to elect Alicia Haussler, Keith Ostermeier and Ed Kyes to serve as the Board Officer Nominating Committee. Marvion Reichert seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor except Alicia Haussler and Ed Kyes who abstained. Motion carried.

NE NATURAL RESOURCES COMMISSION REPORT: Mick Reynolds, Middle

Platte Basin Commission member, reported that the scoring committee has completed ranking the Water Sustainability Fund applications and will present their recommendations to the Natural Resources Commission in December.

NE ASSOCIATION OF RESOURCES DISTRICTS REPORT: No report in November.

COST SHARE PROGRAMS: Applications -- Programs Coordinator Kelly Cole reported that we have received cost share applications for the following programs: NE Soil & Water Conservation, Capacitance Probe, Burn Preparation, and Well Decommissioning (see enclosed). She said the applicants are in compliance with the District's rules and regulations, funds are available, and she recommended they be approved.

Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the cost share applications as reported. Jay Richeson seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Vice-chairman Reynolds said that because the board meeting was a week early and payments would not be made until next week the November financial report would be acted on in December.

UPCOMING EVENTS: Next Board Meeting – Marvion Reichert made the motion to move the December board meeting one week early to the afternoon of December 19 at 2:00 p.m. Keith Ostermeier seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

UPCOMING EVENTS: Vice-chairman Reynolds reviewed the upcoming events that included the January 12 through 15 GMDA Winter Conference in Florida, and the Water Programs Update to be held February 12 at the Dawson County Extension in Lexington.

OTHER BUSINESS: Employee Retirement -- Administrative Director Dianne Miller was congratulated on her retirement as of November 30th. Dianne has worked for the Central Platte NRD since July 1, 1972 and one year prior to that for the Mid-Platte Valley Watershed that was merged into the NRD.

ADJOURN: Vice-chairman Reynolds adjourned the board meeting at 3:22 p.m.

November Report to CPNRD

Attached is a summary of the FY 2020 Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) initial allocations to each Natural Resources District in Nebraska. The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) would typically begin ranking the applications received prior to a November cutoff date with the ranking deadline for all those eligible applications usually set for February sometime.

Well this year is going to be a little different or delayed due to the signing of the New Farm Bill last December. The rule making process is still underway for the New Farm Bill. Until the USDA reads through and acknowledges all the public comments received on the new bill during the public comment periods, a final rule cannot be released. When the final rule has been released, then the USDA-NRCS can announce a program signup cutoff date, and then a program ranking cutoff date, for all the FY2020 programs.

In addition to the New Farm Bill delays, the NRCS Field Office staff is also receiving new conservation planning software for this year, and a new application ranking software/system. Training for NRCS staff on this new planning and ranking software is scheduled to take place in November and December. So, after everything is finalized and we are finally up and running, the actual ranking of the FY2020 applications can occur. Then contract offers will be extended immediately to the highest ranked applications so that fund obligation can be completed as early as possible in 2020. Due to the delays, and all these changes, the actual contracting period for FY 2020 will probably get pushed back closer to the end of the fiscal year.

Contaminates in water affect the health of the fish, please do your part to help keep the bodies of water clean.

It hurts fish gills, covers rocks makes it harder for eggs to hatch.

Manure

Animal waste can be harmful to aquatic life. Decomposing animal waste uses up oxygen and releases pollutants (like nutrients, phosphorous, and ammonia) in the water. Fish like Frannie and Freddie are not able to survive without enough oxygen and cannot survive with the added pollutants in the water.

Fertilizer

Did you know, fertilizers can wash off the grass from rain or watering and run off into the stream? Fertilizer is food for plants. It is often given to plants so they can grow bigger and faster. Fertilizer will also make plants and algae in the water grow. Too many plants in the water can be bad for fish like Francie and Freddie.

Road Salt

Road salt can help melt ice and is good for traffic safety but bad for wildlife, trees, and water under the ground. Have you ever gotten salt in a cut? Ouch!

Have you ever drank salt water? Did you like it?

Litter

It can get caught around fins, choke or suffocate animals. Litter decreases oxygen levels in the water when it decays.

Motor Oil

Oil can harm wildlife like Frannie and Freddie by coating her scales and clogging her gills, if this happens she would have trouble breathing. Oil can also coat Frannie's food.

When air pollutants react with water drops this can cause rain to be polluted.

This is called acid rain.

Pesticides help protect our food from bugs, but if too much is applied it can kill the bugs that Frannie likes to snack on. Fish, especially Frannie and her other aquatic friends, like cool, clean water to live and play in. They like vegetation along the bank to shade the water and keep it cool. The cooler the water the more oxygen for her to breathe. Plus, insects and leaves from vegetation fall into the water providing food for Frannie and her friends.

Dear Landowner:

This letter is to inform you that your "Tenant" has not submitted required report forms for the Central Platte Natural Resources District's Nitrogen Management Program and is in non-compliance of the District's rules and regulations.

The Nitrogen Management Program was developed to address high groundwater nitrate areas of the Central Platte NRD. The goal of the program is to encourage producers to utilize nitrates that are already in the soil and water as opposed to applying more commercial nitrogen. The program requires that producers submit annual report forms for each field they farm in a Phase II or Phase III (high nitrate) areas of the District.

Central Platte NRD staff will be meeting with the Board of Directors on **November 21st**, **2019**. They will be requesting that Cease and Desist orders be issued to the producers that are out of compliance with the Program.

If your tenant does not come into compliance by November 18th, 2019, irrigation rights will be lost until compliance requirements are met. We would prefer not to have to go through the legal process of issuing Cease & Desist orders. We encourage you to contact your tenant and ask them to come into compliance.
