MEETING MINUTES: Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the May board meeting minutes. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor, except Steve Sheen who abstained. Motion carried.

ANNOUNCEMENTS & OTHER BUSINESS FOR FUTURE MEETINGS:

Chairman Reynolds asked if there were any announcements or suggestions for future meetings. There were none.

PUBLIC FORUM: Chairman Reynolds asked if anyone wanted to address the board on any item not included on the agenda. There was none.

EXCUSED ABSENCES: Chairman Reynolds reported that Jim Bendfeldt, Brian Keiser, Jerry Milner, Barry Obermiller, Doug Reeves and Ed Stoltenberg requested to be excused from the board meeting.

Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the absences as requested. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

NRCS REPORT: Jacob Kendrick, Resources Conservationist, gave an update on the cost share programs available through the Central City NRCS office. He also provided information on the upcoming Cover Crop Field Day (see enclosed).

Joe Krolikowski, District Conservationist, gave an update on the compliance reviews (see attached).

BUDGET COMMITTEE: Chairman Reynolds said the Budget Committee met earlier that day to continue their review of the recommended expenditures for Fiscal Year 2022/2023.

Action on Budget of Expenditures for Budget Hearing & Set Public Hearing — Marvion Reichert made the motion to approve the proposed budget of expenditures for the purpose of holding the public budget hearing. Jay Richeson seconded the motion.

Prior to voting on the motion Lyndon Vogt said the estimated property tax request will increase by approximately \$490,000.

All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

Set Public Budget Hearing – Jay Richeson made the motion to set the Public Budget Hearing at 1:45 pm on July 28th. Deb VanMatre seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

WATER QUALITY COMMITTEE: Chairman Charles Maser said the Water Quality Committee met earlier today and reviewed the proposed changes to the Groundwater Management Plan. No action was taken.

WATER UTILIZATION COMMITTEE: Acting chairman Marvion Reichert said the Water Utilization Committee met earlier today.

The committee reviewed the proposed changes to the Groundwater Management Plan and no action was needed at this time.

The committee reviewed the interlocal agreement for NE Geo Cloud, which would extent the project through 2027 in the amount of \$12,000. The project stores airborne geomagnetic imagery.

Marvion Reichert made a motion to approve the NE Geo Cloud Interlocal Agreement for 5 more years at \$2,400 each year, with a total of \$12,000. Keith Ostermeier seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

The committee discussed the Schroeder Property and the possibility of selling the water off the property to DNR. More information will be available at the July board meeting.

2022 STATIC GROUNDWATER LEVELS: Angela Warner, GIS Programs Coordinator, reported that overall, we have an accumulated gain of 0.80 feet since 1982. Warner reported that 11 of the 24 Groundwater Management Areas (GWMA) were below the 1982 level, with 13 of the GWMA above the 1982 levels. Warner reported that GWMA 2 will now be open to transfers and supplemental wells and GWMA's 19 & 23 have triggered below the 25% decline.

NARD PLANS: Lyndon Vogt, General Manger, reported that every 5 years we must sign a new resolution to continue to allow employees to participate in our retirement program.

Marvion Reichert made a motion to adopt the Amendment & Restatement of the NARD 414(h) Plan. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

Marvion Reichert made a motion to adopt the Amendment & Restatement of the NARD 457 Plan. Alicia Haussler seconded the motion. All board members present, voting by roll call vote, were in favor. Motion carried.

MANAGER'S REPORT: Lyndon Vogt supplied a written report to the board and mentioned that currently with our Nitrogen GWMGT Plan we have 9 producers still out of compliance. Luke Zakrzewski, GIS Image Analyst, currently has 4 producers out of compliance, with all but 1 working on getting into compliance.

TREE & WEED BARRIER REPORT: Kelly Cole, Administrative Assistant, reported on the recent sales of trees and weed barrier (see attached).

COST SHARE PROGRAMS: Applications –Kelly Cole, Administrative Assistant, reported that we have received cost share applications for the following programs: Flow Meter (see attached). She said the applicants are in compliance with the district's rules and regulations, funds are available, and she recommended they be approved.

Jay Richeson made the motion to approve the cost share applications as reported.

Irrigation Water Management 449

Cost share for soil moisture probes & Variable Rate Irrigation (VRI) is available. VRI paired with a soil moisture probe on pivots can improve your energy & water use. There has been a significant growth of farmers using real time aerial plant sensor data in conjunction with fertigation to reduce nutrient application, while still maintaining their yields.

Animal Mortality Facility 316

Improve your composting management to reduce objectionable odors and reduce runoff & leaching. The process for this cost-share is longer than a traditional EQIP. This practice is mostly utilized by larger operations. Poultry operations seem to be using drum composters, this facility will reduce the time it takes to produce compost, which is typically one (1) month down to only seven (7) days. Another option would be to implement concrete bins. The cost share amount is dependent on the size of operation.

June Report to CPNRD

During the month of May, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), as part of its responsibility in carrying out the conservation provisions of the National Food Security Act of 1985, as amended, conducted the annual status reviews in the Central Platte NRD and across the state for the 2022 crop year. In total, staff in our 4 offices completed 64 status reviews this year, this required the staff to evaluate each of those 64 tracts for potential wetland and/or highly erodible land issues, and in some cases, tracts contained both.

It has been 37 years now, that the National Food Security Act of 1985 was passed into law. As a reminder, the purpose of this Act is intended to discourage the conversion of wetlands and to reduce soil erosion on Highly Erodible Land (HEL). This was done by linking the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) benefits to conservation compliance. This means if an owner/producer was deemed out of compliance, they would not be eligible to receive any USDA benefits, on any fields they own or operate.

Examples of the USDA benefits producers could receive, or lose, are the direct payments made by the Farm Service Agency (FSA), Farm Bill conservation program participation and possible payments for conservation practices through NRCS, and nowadays probably the biggest benefit is Federal Crop Insurance subsidies through the Risk Management Agency (RMA). Every spring, random names and tracts are drawn out of the database in Kansas City that contain highly erodible land and or wetlands, and those are to be reviewed for conservation compliance described above. The NRCS staff across the United States are tasked with completing these field reviews each year, and then if need, we work with producers to update their conservation plans to maintain compliance and USDA benefits.
